Our objectives for this year are: Assisting in carrying out the Agriculture Adjustment Program, stressing the use of purebred livestock and certified seed by using them ourselves, helping terrace the farms in our community, encouraging the use of cover crops to prevent soil erosin, entering all contests sponsored by the F. F. A.

Accomplishments for this year are pruning and spraying of several hundred fruit trees, terracing several hundred acres of land. We have vaccinated forty head of hogs for cholera, also twenty dogs for rabies. We have built eight wagon beds for farmers at a saving of \$120.00. We have \$72.00 in the bank to credit of chapter as a whole. Our labor income from our projects for 1933-1934 was \$2249.92. Every year our department earns more than it costs to operate it.

Nine members visited F. F. A. camp at Doyle, Tennessee. We placed second in camp athletics, Byars-Hall chapter is largest

Our motto is: Learning to do, Doing to learn, Earning to live, Living to serve.







Byars-Hall lost to the strong Jackson team, champions of West Tennessee, by a score of 6-0. In this game Bill Hunt was injured, and this was a severe handicap as the backfield consisted of men with limited exper-

ience. Hunt, R. Tanner, Robinson, G. Pinner, Fisher, Johnson, Roper, O. Ellis, and Capt. Portis will be lost by graduation. Portis was selected on the All-West Tennessee eleven with Ellis receiving honorable mention. Robinson and Tanner won their fourth letter in football.

Landon "Pop" Turner was elected to captain the 1935 eleven. Ten lettermen will form the nucleus of the team. In addition to Turner, they are: Jennings, Ralph, Parr, F. Tanner, Sherrod. M. Ellis, Price, Jamison, and Beasley. Jennings promises to develop into a thriple-threat man. His passing at times has been good, his running and kicking have been above the average. Parr will be given a try at a backfield berth, a position he filled capably in two games last season. Pinner's place at blocking back will be hard to fill. In the line will be found five juniors with two years experience. Tanner is the only letterman in the line who will be a senior. Ralph is returning at full. Beasley is a promising tackle.

Thomas Webb made a very efficient manager. His successor has not been named, but he will have to be good to fill "T's" shoes. 1935 Schedule

TRACK


The track season of 1934 was a disastrous one as far as the winning of points is concerned. Only the Robbins boys, Pinner, Davis, and Parr were able to win their letters and a very few points in the district and regional meets. Of this group of lettermen, only Parr is on the 1935 squad.

Felix Tanner and Bill Hunt, two ineligibles of last year, are expected to be two of the mainstays of the present thinclad crew. Elmoffat Glenn was hindered by illness last season, but the little fellow is expected to make good in the 880 yard run as well as make the relay team. Billy Portis, football captain, is a creditable quarter-miler. Tanner should be among the best hurdlers and high jumpers. Bill Hunt will be an able contender in both track and field with the broad jump his specialty. Parr and Pinner are both fast men and should do well in the dashes as well as the relay. Turner, Jennings, and M. Ellis are other candidates worthy of notice. King, Roper, Rice, and Baltzer are the pole vaulters with Roper being the only one with experience.

Oney Ellis, the heavyweight among the B. V. D. boys, should handle the shot and discus with more success than last year which was his first. Johnson is again out for the high jump and stands an excellent chance of counting some points in that event. Several men are out for the first time and some valuable stars may develop from this group.

Spring football delayed the start of track practice for most of the men yet most of them have been on the basketball squads or spring football and should get into condition quickly.

Several dual meets will be scheduled. The district meet will again be held at Whitehaven. The West Tennessee Regional Meet is to be held at Covington as usual. Central of Memphis is the present titleholder. More attention is being given to track in this section with baseball losing ground as a high school sport. This has resulted in a better all-round performance by individuals and the schools also.



Mr. R. K. Castellaw, coach of football, basketball and track, graduated from Union University. He coached successful teams at Millington for four years before coming to Byars-Hall. He came to Covington in 1928 and has produced winning teams here consistently every year. His football teams have played 69 games, won 55, lost 11 and tied 3 over a period of seven years. His basketball and track teams have given a good account of themselves every season. The basketball team this year played 17 games and lost 4, ending the season with a splendid record. Newbern is the only team that has ever won more than three games from Byars-Hall in our football history. Only two other teams, Brownsville and Dyersburg, have won three.

Miss Lucile Hines graduated from Tennessee College, Murfreesboro, and coached three years at Dickson, Tennessee. She has one year of graduate work at Western Ky. State College. With only three regulars left from last years team, she developed one of the best girls' teams in the history of Byars-Hall. Her team played 15 games and won 11 of them. Miss Hines has proven her ability to produce winning teams. With all the regulars

back next year, she will have a team that will be second to none. Mr. C. E. Johnson coached the Byars-Hall teams from 1925 to 1928. He produced the only undefeated championship team of Byars-Hall--namely, the famous team of '27. Ask him about it. Mr. Johnson, a graduate of the University of Tennessee, has continued to assist in coaching of football and kept up his interest


