The all American football Coach, Earl Billings, kept everyone in slim trim by making all take exercise every morning and night.


The tall, dark, and handsome Walker twins kept all the girls drooling over their marvelous physique.

I, Bobby Yarbro, will my mo - hawk haircut to Peachie Blackwell. Now you can attract some attention, Peachie!






Girls' Basketball Team 1951 - 52






The Boys' Basketball Team 1951 - 52



