With The Pirates On The Hardwood

Pirates Victorious

The Frazier Pirates continued their winning ways here Thursday afternoon by defeating the Allen-White Bears in the District 3 Tournament by a score of 89-51.

The Pirates, never in serious scoring trouble, were plagued by fouls through the first half and part of the second. At the game's end, two of the starting five players, Jordan and Ross, had one foul remaining while the Pirates center, Otis Somerville, had previously fouled out.

Robie Ross sparked the Frazier attack with almost unerring accuracy, scoring 40 points, 20 in each half. With those points Ross set a long held tournament record.

Ross was followed by Curtis Watkins with 16 points, and Isaac Peete with 13. Despite the Pirates defensive hold, they were unable to stop Allen-White's Fred Harris as he scored 35 points.

Ripley Upsets Frazier

The Frazier Pirates - slightly favored over Lauderdale High School because of their magnificent home court record, were badly defeated by Lauderdale by a score of 84-58.

The Pirates, who performed so superbly against the Allen-White Bears, displayed little of that skill against the Lauderdale Hornets.

Pirate coaches, Shelvie Rose and Elbert Johnson, used all 10 men to try to relinquish the Lauderdale attack, but all seemed useless as Lauderdale pulled further and further into the lead.

The game played against Ripley was thought, by many, to be the worst game the Pirates have played all season. This was the greatest margin by which the Pirates had been beaten this season.

Ripley was led in scoring by Springfield with 20 points, Scott with 19 and Tyus with 18.

The Pirates were led by Curtis Watkins and Robie Ross with 16 points each. Also scoring in double figures were Isaac Peete and Roosevelt "Pap" Jordan with 10 points each.

Frazier Overruns Ellis

The Frazier Pirates defeated their cross-county rivals - Ellis High Tigers by a score of 68-42 to capture the consolation third place trophy of District 9.

The pirates, never in serious scoring trouble, led throughout the game. Frazier's main assets were their magnificent control shooting and superb rebounds of Watkins and Jordan.

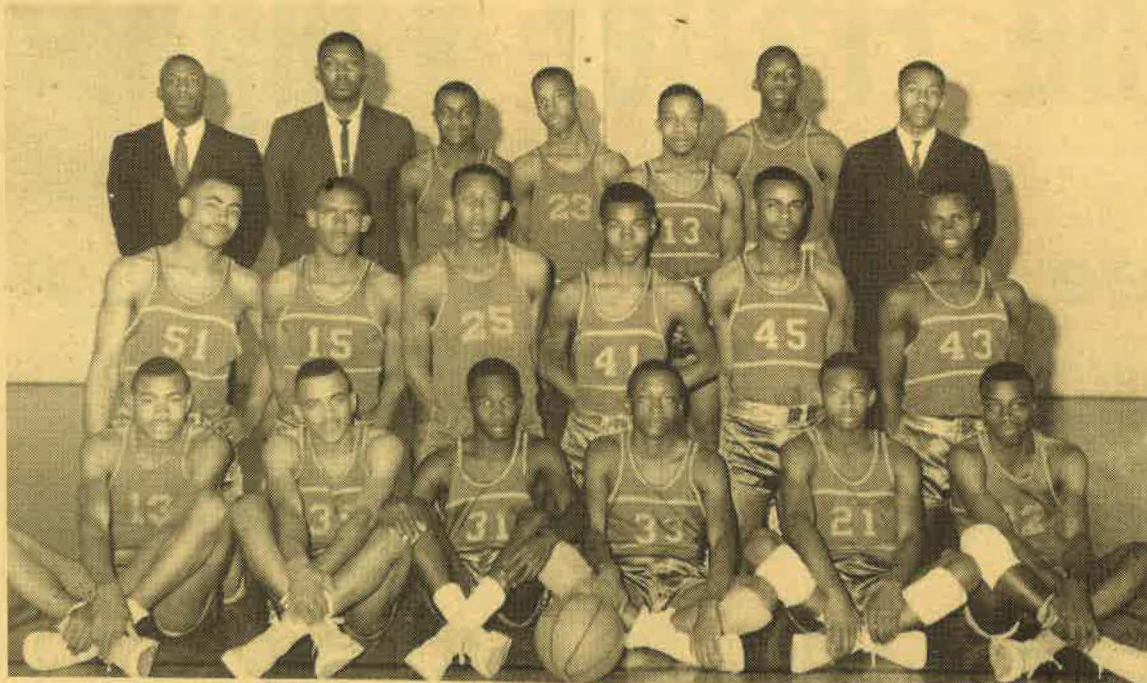
The Tigers, who have dominated the Pirates for the last four years, had their string of victories broken this year as they were defeated twice in the regular season, and once in the District 9 Tournament at the hands of the Pirates.

Many people (including yours truly) thought that the beating the Pirates took from Lauderdale, Friday night would have mental effect on the way the Pirates would play against Ellis. Even though they took a beating at the hands of Lauderdale, the Pirates showed no emotional strain Saturday night as they performed highly against the Tigers of Ellis.

The Pirates were led in scoring by Otis Somerville with 19 points, and Roosevelt Jordan with 17 points.

The Pirates - who put three men on the all-district team - were tied with Lauderdale of Ripley for three men on the all-district team. The Pirates were represented on the team by Robie Ross, Curtis Watkins and Roosevelt Jordan.

With the Pirates victory over Ellis High, they ended their 1964-65 basketball season with a taste of victory hanging behind them. The Pirates expect to have one of the best teams in the district

next year, losing only two players - center, Otis Somerville, and guard Robert Smith.

On March 9, the Regional 3 tournament began at Merry High School in Jackson. Our district was represented by Carver of Brownsville and Lauderdale of Ripley.

Results of District 9

The District 9 Basketball Tournament results for the boys served as a mirror to reflect the season's standings. At the season's end the teams were rated as Carver High of Brownsville, first; Lauderdale High of Ripley, second; Frazier High of Covington, third; and Ellis High of Munford in fourth place. This is the order they finished in the district, with the exception of Lauderdale in first place and Carver in second.

The girls' division of the tournament showed two major upsets. Allen-White High School of Whites-

ville defeated their county rival, Bolivar Industrial School, who had twice been victorious over Allen-White during regular season play. It was the same story as Lauderdale defeated Gallor of Mason, after being subdued by Gallor twice during regular season competition. The girls finished with Fayette County Training School, Somerville, first; Lauderdale High School, Allen-White and Gallor - in that order.

Even though Bland was not up to par, the Pirates William Ross and Willie Paul Hayes substituted superbly for him, having scored 15 and 13 points.

High scoring honors for Tabernacle were shared by Othrel Teamer and Larry Culbreath each scoring 11 points.

Frazier Elementary girls along with their boys captured first place in the zone tournament by defeating Tabernacle Elementary girls team by a score of 21-13.

Tabernacle girls and boys were on the receiving end as they lost two to Frazier and having to settle for double second place trophies.

Tabernacle closed in on Frazier a few times during the game but Frazier managed to maintain the lead.

Frazier was led in scoring by forward Christine Adams who added 13 points to the winning cause.

Ellis Outpoints Frazier

The Frazier Grammar School was defeated by Ellis Grammar School in the semi-finals of the county wide tournament by a 32-30 margin.

The outcome of the game was anybody's guess until the sound of the final buzzer.

No team throughout the game ever had a real commanding lead.

The Pirates did not perform as they had done in the zone tournament, but they did maintain the status that showed the mark of a champion.

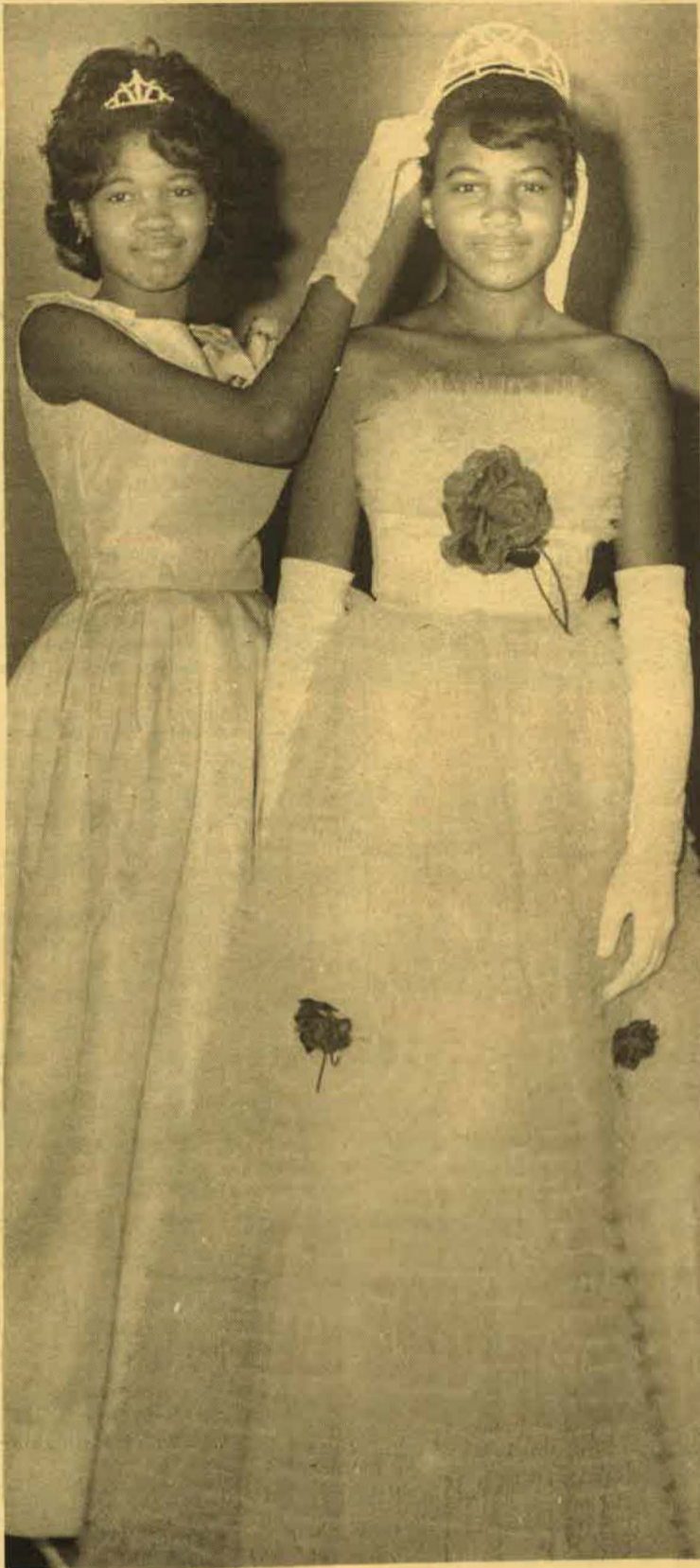
