



CLASS HISTORY

They are Annabel Johnson, June Huffman, David Tinkler, and Luther James. Their teacher for the first grade was Miss Addie Strong. She is probably well remembered by these four for breaking rulers over legs absent-mindedly left in the aisles.

After stumbling through the first grade and acquiring some small amount of ability to read and write, we advanced proudly to the second grade, where we ran upon Lucile Penner, Beulah Farmer, and Billy Gene Smith. Lucile came from Burlison; Beulah, from Leigh's Chapel; and Billy Gene, from Liberty.

Progressing along the path of our third year we picked up Leta Anthony from Clopton.

While struggling through the fourth grade and its pitfalls of 'geography, long division, and the like, we happened upon Ruby Jean Bennett from Holly Grove. Then we all traveled together through the fifth grade, where we successfully coped with a variety of educational hurdles deemed necessary for the advancement of our knowledge.

Mr. Rudolph Baird, our teacher in the sixth grade, left us during the term for another job and his wife took up where he left off. Jessie Pearl Horn entered our class that year.

In the seventh grade we found another Holly Grove girl, Bettye Knight, and boy, were we glad to find that she could really play basketball! Already we were looking toward high school. After the close of the seventh grade Lucile Penner moved to Memphis, but returned at the close of the eighth year.

We made another pick-up in the eighth grade. Elaine Elkins was shipped to us from Kentucky. At the end of the year, we smugly exhibited our eighth-grade certificates.

Entering our Freshman year, very proud of ourselves and completely unconscious of any greenness, we increased our class to a total of forty-nine. Holly Grove sent us Doris McWilliams, Mary Lee Goforth, Juanita McWilliams, Nora Lee Whitesides, and Hayes Delashment. From Dunlap Orphanage School came Betty Ann Barnhardt, Bobby Gill, and Ernest Taylor. Emily Moffatt, Mary Liles, Marie Sage, Billy Joe McClerkin arrived from Salem. Almyra gave us Hazel Gladney, Cora Gray Wright, Marjorie Mayberry, Bill McClain, James Robert Fee, and Floyd Dungy. Christine Cross came from Mt. Carmel. Even at this early stage in our high school career, we fairly sprouted with basketball ability. From our group, as time progressed, came half a dozen girls and several boys who were to wear the red suits for Brighton High.

Our class officers that first year of high school were as follows: President, James Robert Fee; Vice-President, Bobby Gill; Secretary-Treasurer, Juanita McWilliams; Sponsor, Mr. Huffman. Betty Ann Barnhardt the ninth grade's candidate that year for queen of the Harvest Festival, and we came second in the running--not a bad showing for freshmen. The class entertainment in the spring was a wiener roast.

In the tenth grade we lost classmates in place of gaining them, some moving away and others going into some branch of the armed services. Nevertheless the group that remained possessed a great deal of get-up-and-go. Our queen in the tenth year, was Bettye Knight. Again we came second in the race, but we still maintain that we ran nobly. Our sponsor was Miss Eloise Shoaf. Class officers were these: President, Bobby Gill; Vice-President, David Tinkler; Secretary-treasurer, Bettye Knight.

We passed along through the eleventh grade by the hardest. By that time we had gained so much knowledge of various sorts that we began to wonder where we'd put any more. In April of that year we entertained the seniors with a banquet, cooked by our girls. The boys came in for different tasks. We served the

supper in the school lunch room, which, with its decorations along the April showers theme, was scarcely recognizable as the same spot where we were accustomed to gobble our lunches each day at noon. There were games and contests for entertainment.

The name of our Junior play was "His Name Was Aunt Nellie," Aunt Nellie was acted by Dave Tinkler, and the feminine charms he exhibited took the audience by storm. Our queen in this eleventh year was Juanita McWilliams, and for the third time we ended up with second place. Our hopes were still not dashed though. We made up our minds to win in our Senior year. Our sponsor was Mr. Huffman. Class officers were Bill McClain, President; James Robert Fee, Vice-President; Emily Moffatt, Secretary; Mary Lee Goforth, Treasurer.

We entered the twelfth grade with twenty-three bright students. Very soon, however, Cupid hit one of our girls, Jessie Pearl Horn. We were especially sorry to lose her from our basketball team.

Our Harvest Festival queen for this year was June Huffman, and at last our class hit the top, after working very hard. June's escort for the coronation ceremony was James Robert Fee, and the junior queens were Jo Ann Banks of the fifth grade and Barbara Bennett of the first grade. How proud we were to see them crowned!

Our Senior play was "Good Gracious, Grandma," another laugh provoker. Class officers were David Tinkler, President; Bettye Knight, Vice-President; Juanita McWilliams, Secretary; James Robert Fee, Treasurer. Our sponsors were Miss Frances Strong and Mr. Fentress Huffman.

We have now fulfilled the requirements our Alma Mater exacts before she will allow us to venture from beneath her protecting wing. We look toward the unknown future, but often we shall also look backward to the twelve busy years, the twelve good years, that we spent in preparing ourselves for a full and rich adult life.







The remaining minutes, however, were not quite long enough and the end of the game caught us with the score 28-22 in Hornbeaks favor and with Brighton in the position of West Tennessee Runner-Up.


