





Mr. R. K. Castellaw, coach of football, basketball and track, graduated from Union University. He coached successful teams at Millington for four years befoe coming to Byars-Hall. He came to Covington in 1928 and has produced winning teams here consistently every year. His football teams have played 69 games, won 55, lost 11 and tied over a period of seven years. His basketball and track teams have given a good account of themseves every season. The basketball team this year played 17 games and lost 4, ending the season with a splendid record. Newbern is the only team that has ever won more than three games from Byars-Hall in our football history. Only two other teams, Brownsville and Dyersburg, have won three.

Miss Lucile Hines graduated from Tennessee College, Murfreesboro, and coached three years at Dickson, Tennessee. She has one year of graduate work at Western Ky. State College. With only three regulars left from last years team, she developed one of the best girls' team in the history of Byars-Hall. Her team played 15 games and won 11 of them. Miss hines has proven her ability to produce winning teams. With all the regulars back next year, she will have a team that will be second to none.

Mr. C. E. Johnson coached the Byars-Hall teams from 1925 to 1928. He produced the only undefeated championship team of Byars-Hall -- namely, the famous team of '27. Ask him about it. Ruffin will assume Parham's tackle position, Billy Brown will replace Charles Elam at guard, and Larry Whitley, lanky sophomore, is slated to start at end in place of Edward Massey.

Sam Naifeh, tackle, and Winford Joy, back, who remained out of the Jackson game because of injuries, have fully recovered and will be back at their regular positions.

Byars Halls' boys will be dressing out in new uniforms, and the girls also are expected to have new suits soon. The boys' outfits are in silver, trimmed in purple and gold.

Three of last year's regulars are lost to the boys' squad this year, Johhny Green, JImmy Witherington and Johnny Johnson. Returning lettermen whom the Purple and Gold mentor will utilize as a basis for his team are three forwards; Larry Whitley, George Kinney and Jimmy Taylor; three guards, George Baltzer, Billy Brown, and Savage Turner; and Hayes Owen at center.

Baltzer, a four year letterman, was elected captain of the team by the players at practice Tuesday afternoon.

Miss Lucile Hines, girls coach, has been working for the past three weeks with a squad of about

The tide turned in Whitehaven's favor when Savage Turner fouled out of the game shortly after the second period started. Hayes Owen, covered by two Whitehaven guards, found his scoring limited to 11 points, Whitley added 10.

Other scoring for Covington included Baltzer 3, Taylor 1, Turner 1, Anderson 2, Byars 2, and Dawson 2.

50 years ago life was different from what it is today. There have been many changes, and much progress. Progress always means change, but change does not always mean progress.

Our high school years were more wholesome. There were no drugs, little money, and few cars (accessible to teenagers). We had fun riding bikes, skating, hiking, going to the ice-cream parlors in the drug stores, street dances, singing around the piano, and going to the 15¢-25¢ movies. It was a thrill to get a group together and go riding on a Sunday afternoon with some lucky boy who had managed to get use of the family car. There was only parking space at the school for the teachers who had cars, and for the school buses. Students who lived in the town of Covington walked to school every day - regardless of the weather, and the rural students rode school buses. Girls wore skirts and sweaters (or dresses) and socks and saddle oxfords to school. Boys wore slacks and sport shirts. A few boys wore ties. No jeans!

50 years ago we could go anywhere at anytime - day or night - alone or in a group - and be safe. Few people ever locked doors. In fact, a lot of people did not own keys.

Very few of us had any money, but we didn't feel poor because most people were in the same boat - and, more importantly, the worth of a person, in those days, was not determined by his financial status.

We respected authority, respected our teachers, respected our leaders, respected our flag and our country, and respected each other. Our parents were in control of us.

Do you remember

When U-Cum-Inn was the place to go? Nearly every day and night there was someone there dancing to the nickelodeon music. They had the best toasted chicken salad sandwiches anywhere, and those harbecue sandwiches with mustard slaw were one of a kind!

When we had street dances? The east side of the square would be roped off and we would dance ballroom dances on the street. Parents and others would line the square to watch. There was never any rowdiness or trouble and everyone could dance who wanted to.

When the swimming pool was behind the ice plant? The very cold water poured into the pool on a hot summer day. You could buy a season ticket for \$5.00 or \$6.00 and go in every afternoon and night all season.

When you walked down the halls at Byars-Hall High School and saw the pictures of all the graduation classes that had preceded you? It kept you from feeling too important.

When there was no air-conditioning in school? Somehow, you don't remember feeling too hot.

When the stores stayed open until 12 o'clock on Saturday nights? The crowds came to town and the streets were full of people until midnight. People did their week's shopping. The barber shops were extra busy on Saturday night.

When we had Chapel at school in the study hall on a regular basis? A visiting Minister would give the Devotional and we had prayer and singing.

When Mr. Lee Baltzer had the Coca-Cola Bottling Plant down on East Pleasant street? There was a beautiful little landscaped garden beside it. Mr. Lee would come to the school and give us pencils and other useful gifts. He was always so civic minded and supportive

of the athletic programs.

When you could see a good black and white movie at the Ruffin Theater for 15¢ - 25¢? "Bank Night" was on Wednesday night when they would draw a name and give away \$25.00 to the lucky winner who had to be present.

When you could get an ice cream soda or cherry coke or limeade or sundae for 10¢ at the Union Drug Store and Baltzer Drug Store. There were 3 or 4 small round tables with chairs where you could spend several hours visiting with friends.

The Community House on Main Street? The beautiful old Sanford home where we had dances, meetings, etc.

Bailey's Department Store? They had wonderful ladies' hats to try on.

The Supply Company? They had a very efficient system to handle the money. The clerk would put your money in a round brass can and it would go by cable or something and soon come flying back with your change inside.

When there was a cotton gin on the corner between Highway 51 and College Street where Patterson's Carpets now stands? Every fall the lot around it was filled with cotton wagons pulled by mules.

The row of Negro houses on College Street between West Pleasant and Washington Street where the parking lot and City Gas Department is now? They were shot-gun houses, neat and clean with the dirt yards swept clean, and locust trees in the yards that smelled wonderful.

When the City and County Library was in Mrs. Rose Hamilton's and Mrs. Lina Brown's home on Maple Street?

When Miss Charlie Maclin taught "Expression"?

The old Hatchie River Bridge? It was made of wooden planks, with the bottom row placed crossways and another layer of two planks wide going lengthwise for the car wheels to run on. You could not pass on the bridge.
