















CLASS PROPHECY

For the past two years Mr. Castellaw has been very ably aided by Mr. James Simonton, Erskine graduate and successful coach of cage teams at Brighton.



Byars-Hall opened the 1940 season by defeating Millington 34-0. With only a small nucleus of players left from 1939, the team performed well, with fast, tricky work in the backfield and plenty of drive in the line.

In the next game Bartlett showed unexpected opposition and forced the Covington boys to extend themselves to win 18-0.

Capitalizing on an intercepted pass and a reverse that caught the Byars-Hall secondary out of position Dyersburg turned in two 80 yard touchdowns and eventually won 19-13 although outnumbered in first downs eleven to two.

In one of the hardest fought games of the season Ripley stopped a line play for conversion of an extra point and won 14-13.

Using every player in uniform our ranks descended on Halls with a nine touchdown barrage and won 64-12.

The Ridgley game which Byars-Hall won 14-0 was played in sweltering weather. Blankenship's 60 yard touchdown was the high spot of the encounter.

Whitehaven's hard charging team outfought us to win 13-0, as blocked punts and fumbles hampered us throughout the game.

Jackson received a surprise in the Covington team that held them 6-6 at the half, but superior weight and reserves enabled them to take the long end of a 20-6 final score.

After being outplayed for three quarters Some erville pushed over two touchdowns in the final stanza to win over Byars-Hall 14-0.

In a rousing fourth quarter uprising that metted two touchdowns Byars-Hall defeated Brownsville 20-13 to close the season.

Thirteen men played their last football for Byars-Hall. They are: Brown, Walker, Bryan, Turiner, Blankenship, Medus, Robinson, Robbins, Kinney, Byars. Owen. Blasengame and Payne.

Captain Billy Brown was honored by his selection as guard on the Big Ten all-star team.

Basketball "A" Team

The boys' basketball team, turned in an impressive record of 22 victories against 3 defeats. The Purple and Gold carried off two trophies, winning the Jeff-Davis League and Third District championships. In regional play the boys lost an overtime thriller to Memphis Central 25-22 in the quarter finals.

Captained by Billy Brown and Hays Owen, the cagers turned in this remarkable record with only one of last years regulars. Hays Owen was the only returning member of the 1939-40 team, which was undefeated in regular season play. The only defeats of the current season were by Central 32-27 and Jackson who dropped in a last-second field goal to win 27-25.

Several seniors who graduate this year will leave places hard to fill. Billy Brown, Hays Owen, Glen Medus, Alvin Byars, Uzell Rose, Ed Blasengame, and Henry Robinson have played their last basketball for Byars-Hall.

With Uzell Rose at center, Willard Max and Henry Robinson at guards and Glen Medus and Alvin Byars at forwards, the team performed well as a unit and provided the "A" team with valuable reserve material when competition was tough.

Miss Hines has coached the girls' teams for seven years and each year has had an outstanding team, always one of the strongest in West Tennessee and one known to represent the best in clean sportsmanship. The 1941 regional trophy, the first ever awarded a girls' team at Byars-Hall as a symbol of West Tennessee supremacy, was the twelfth that has been added to our collection since she took over the helm.



The 1941 girls' basketball team, coached by Miss Lucille Hines and captained by Dorothy Butler, was a small but marvelous combine. Composed of five Sophomores and two Juniors, they captured more laurels than has any other team in the history of Byars-Hall in one year. During the entire season, they played 22 games, won 19, lost 2 and tied one. The first trophy awarded this team was for the Jeff-Davis Lesgue Championship; then later the Third District Championship was won in a last-minute thriller from Munford. Finally to climax a brilliant record, these mighty mites succeeded in dethroning Bolivar, queens of 1940, in regional play to become the youngest and smallest team ever to ascend the throne. Witherington, Butler, and Pinner made the Third District All-Ster team.

COLUMN STAFF


The Column Staff is comprised of reporters from the various classes and clubs. A different member each week edits the news items collected.

The Club is affiliated with the American Home Economics Association, and when the West Tennessee Association met four delegates from this club attended.




Library Club


