OF EDUCATION

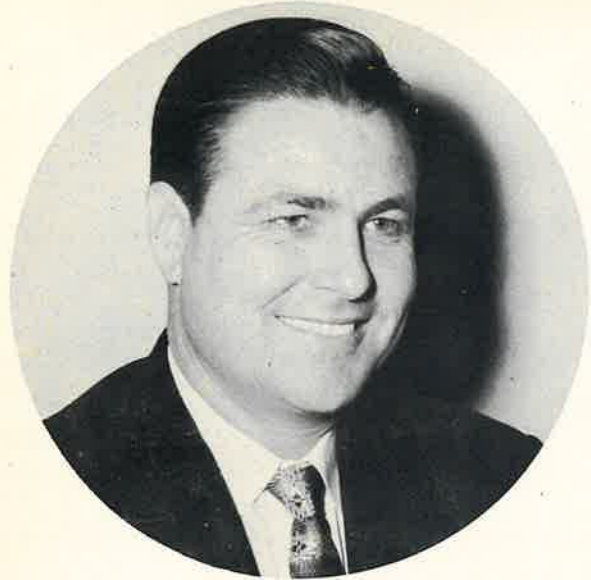

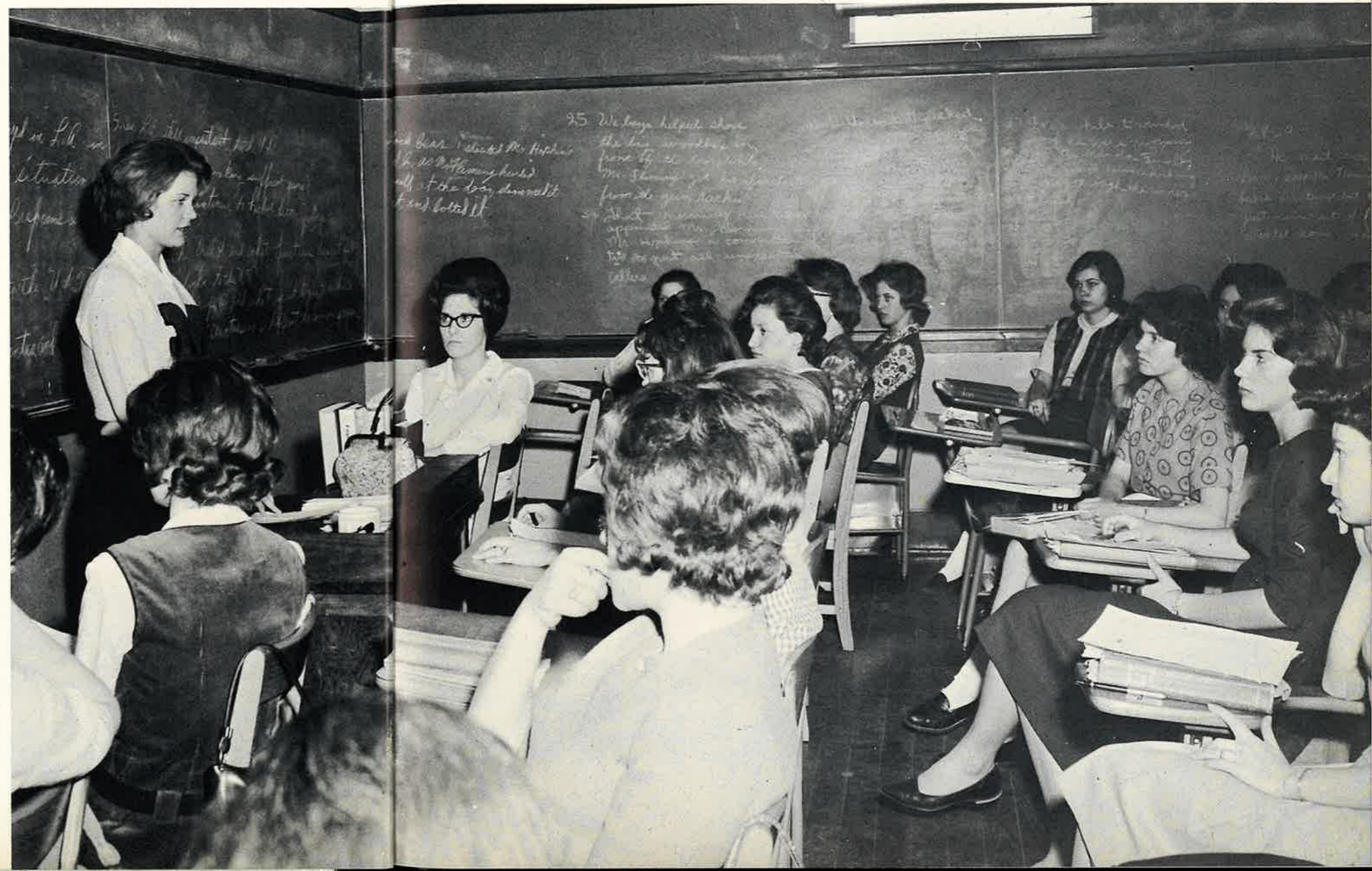


THIS OUR YEAR

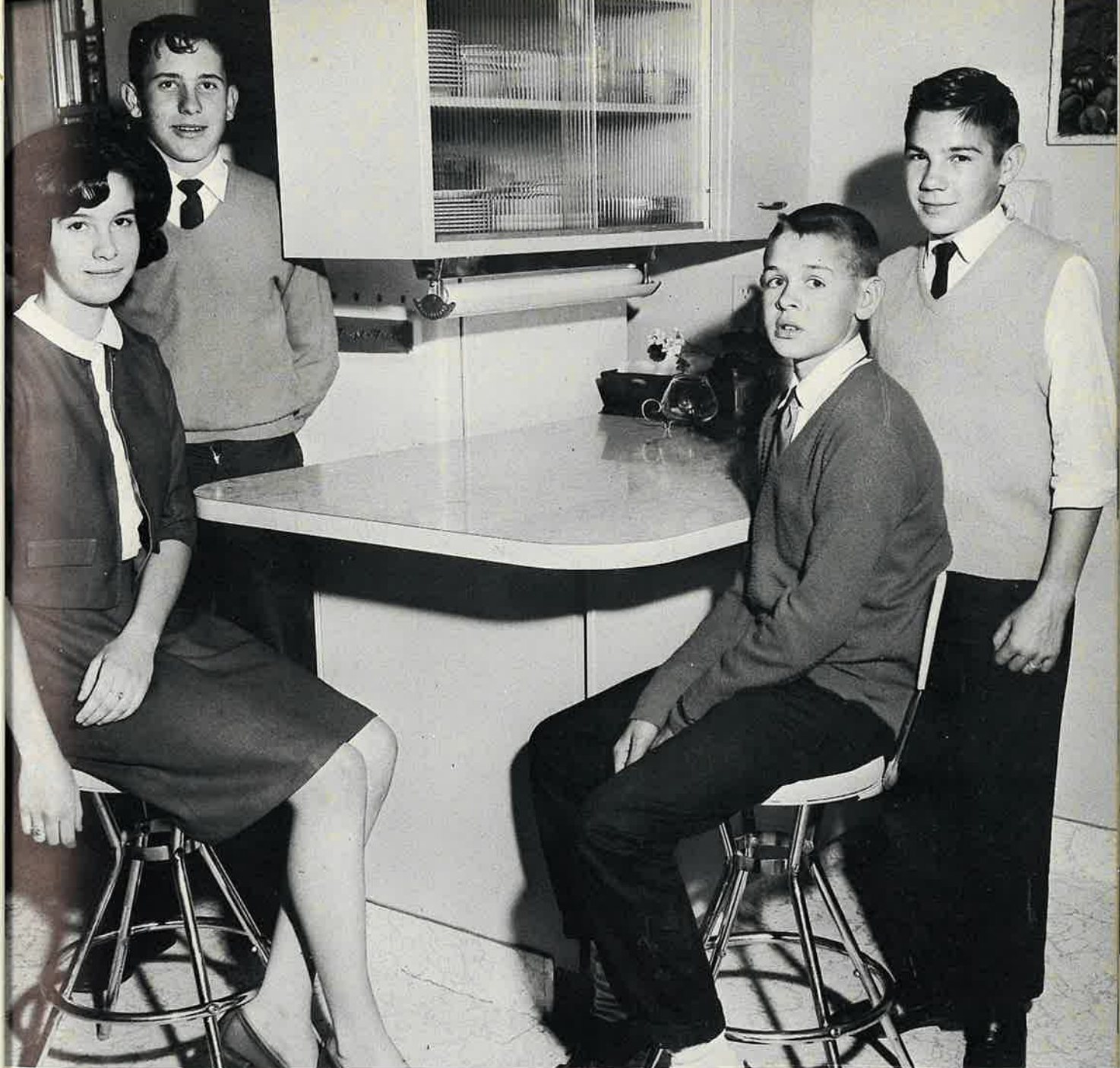

The Bartlett Chapter of the National Honor Society initiated and inducted the Munford Chapter on May 6, 1964 in an inspiring program.



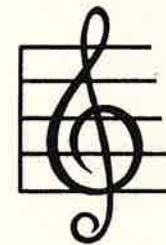


BAND

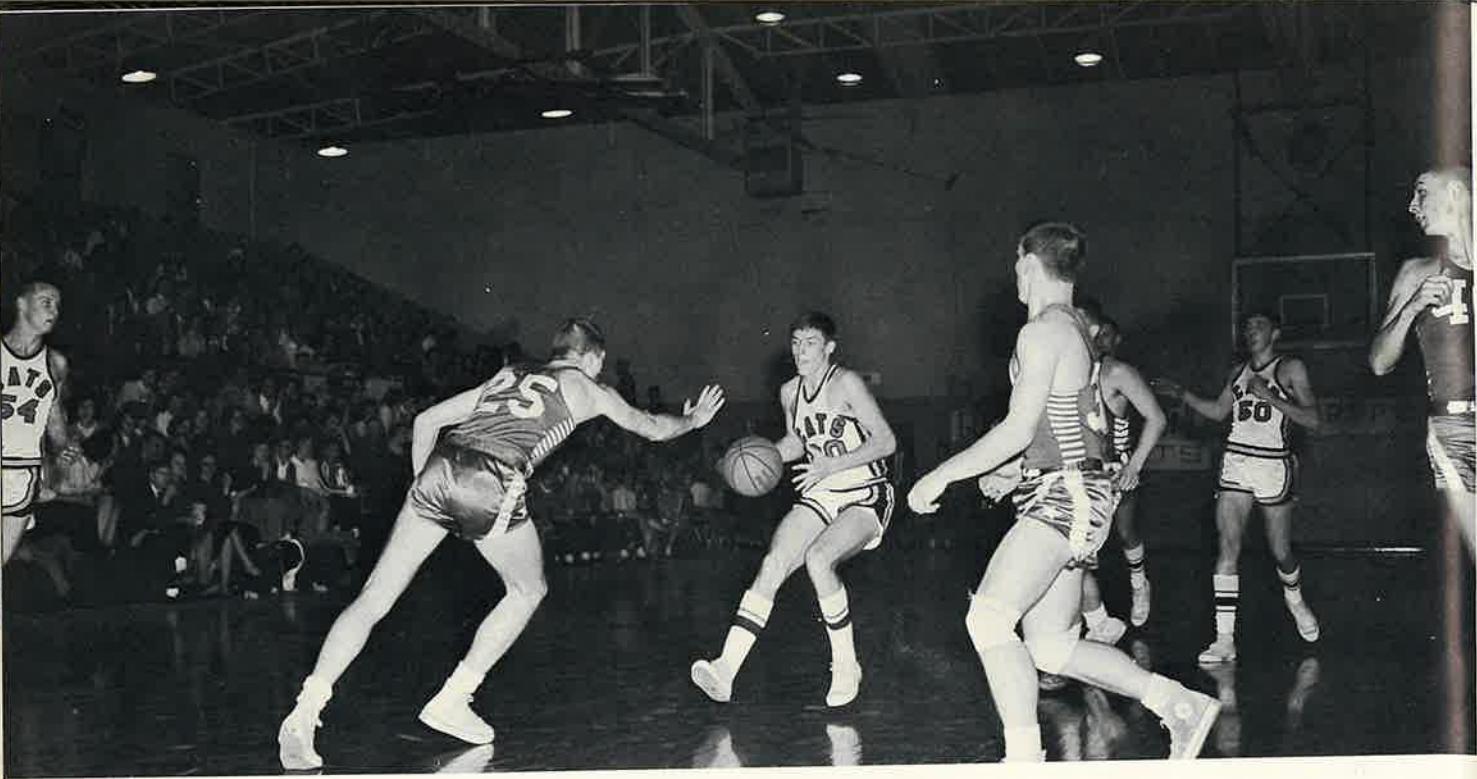

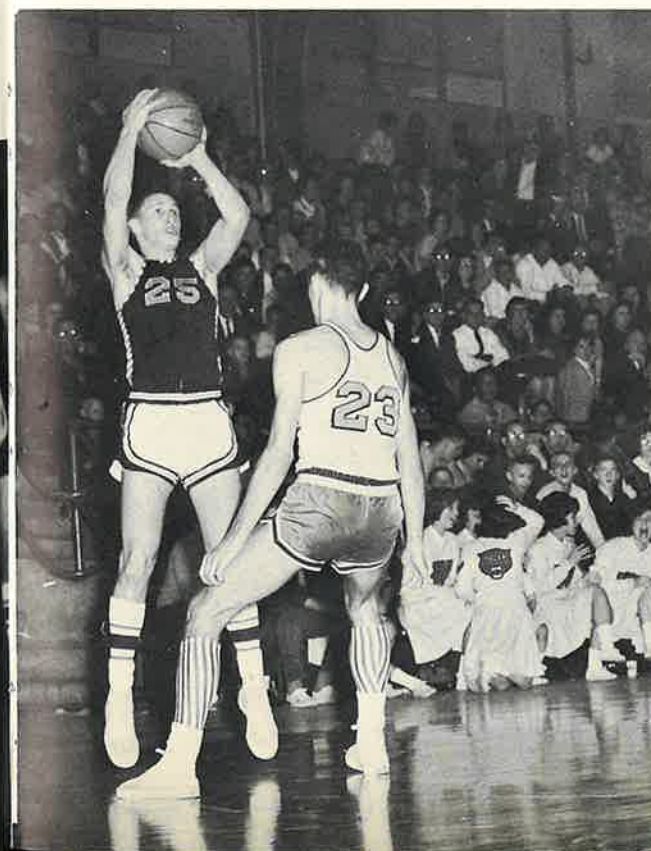
